III. Students with Disabilitie Top

5. Do all students have to meet the LOTE requirements?

Yes. All students must meet the onredit of LOTE equirement earn a diploma A student with a disability may be exempted from such equirements if the student's Committee on Special Education (CSE) has determined that the student's disability adversely affects his or her ability to learn a language and has recommended on the students' Individualized Education (IEP) that the student be exempted from LOTE for students with disabilities

15. What happens if a student successfully completes the LOTIE(s) of study, but fails the locally developed Checkpoint A examination in grade 8 or earlier

The studentmay attempt to pass a subsequent locally developed Checkpoint Aexamination in order to earn one (1) unit of credit to satisfy the LOTE

requirements, or a student with a disability declassified while in grade\$29and whose last IEP prior to declassification includedIaOTEexemption, may be exempted from this requirement.

21. Can the one (1) unit of diploma credit requirement in a Lotanthe diploma be met with two or more languages?

Yes. However, in order to earn a unit offiploma credit in LOT Equired for graduation, students must still demonstrate competency/proficiency in the targletinguage and culture as defined in the learning outcomes for Level 1 in a single language and culture, base then New York State's syllabi, including the Modern Language for Communication, American Sign Language for Communication of the 2st Century, and the State's Learning Standards in LOT Hor Checkpoint A.

22. Can a student take an independent study course in a Lantereceive units of credit towards a diploma?

VI. Transfer StudentsTop

23. What provisions are there for a transfer student?

A student who transfers into the New York State public school system is required to meet the one (1) unit of credit requirement in LOTE or a diploma.

- x A student who transfers to a New York State school prior to grade thould begin LOTIEstruction no later than grade 8 so that they can meet the 2 smit study requirement by the end of grade 9n order to earn the one (1) unit of diploma credit in LOTEquired for graduation prior to grade 9,s/he must successfully complete two (2) units of study (or pass an accelerated grade 8 program of study) and pass a locally developed proficiency examination that is aligned to the Checkpoint A Learning Standards
- x A student who transfers at the high school level must successfully complete a commencement level, yearlong Level 1 high school course of study in a single Lio Totteder to earn the one (1) unit of diploma **die** required forgraduation. No Checkpoint A leveexamination required after 8th grade.

25. If a high schoolstudent is placed in an advanced level of OTE because s/he speaks the language at home, must s/he still earn 3 units of credit to meet the LOTE requirements for a Regents Diploma with Advanced Designation?

Regardless of where a student is placed LOTE instruction, in order to receive the Regents with Advanced Designation using a LOTE sequence, the student would still need to eather units of credit in a LOTE ubject and passa locally developed omprehensive Checkpoint level examination.

VII. Credit By Examination Top

26. Will students be allowed to earn unit(s) of credit through Credit by Examination (i.e., "challenging") either the locally developed comprehensive Checkpoint A or Checkpoint B examination?

No. Since the locally developed LOEMamination is not a "Statedeveloped" or a "Stateapproved" assessment (8 NYCRR \$00.5[d][1][ii]), earning unit(s) of diploma creditrough Credit by Examination is not possible.

VIII. Locally Developed Testsop

27. How should the locally developed Checkpoint A and Checkpoint B examination developed?

Districts/schools have the option to join other schools in a consortium to develop Checkpoint A kenvel B examinations they can design their own as a school or district adopt a vendormade assessment

The locally developed Checkpoint A Second Language Proficiency Examination and the Checkpoint B Comprehens Examination in a LOTE should:

- assess speaking, listening, reading, and writing using a format that is as rigorous as the previously available
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29. Is it possible to provide rhakeup" locally-developed Checkpoint A or Checkpoint B examinationsat any time in the course of the school year?

Yes. This is permissible as long as the students involved have met the eligibility requirement(s), including unit(s) of study. However, if a school or district is part of examination consortium, in order to maintain testing integrity, it is important to consult
